Description

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Fuerteventura is the oldest island in the Canary Islands and is sparsely populated. The official language is Spanish. Small coastal towns, cliffs in the west, arid, desert-like landscapes with rolling plains, romantic palm groves, extinct volcanic craters, and 13 nature reserves ensure there's never a dull moment. Thanks to its sparse population, Fuerteventura guarantees a relaxing getaway away from mass tourism and is also a paradise for water sports enthusiasts.

More information

Water temperatures ranging from 19° C to 25° C make for very pleasant dives. A unique abundance of fish, large species, and steeply sloping reef edges with rock crevices and overhangs make every dive unforgettable. Groupers, rays, and moray eels are frequently encountered. With a bit of luck, you might also spot dolphins and manta rays. And that's not all. In addition to large sea turtles, spider crabs, cat sharks, and ghost crabs, diving along the whale migration route is a unique experience. A variety of dive sites ranging from 6 m to 40 m in depth offers an adventure for every diver.

Temperatures range from 21°C to 28°C and remain constant throughout the year. Compared to the other Canary Islands, this island receives the least amount of rainfall, so humidity levels remain moderate. Weather phenomena such as Calima and Sirocco—very hot winds from the Sahara—occur only rarely.
